#### **Economic Growth**

- Economic growth is an increase in goods or services being produced
- Often measured (at the local or political levels) by proxies such as:
  - Number of jobs
  - Number of factories or businesses
- The performance of economic developers is often measured in these terms



### Why Economic Growth as a Metric?

- It's easy to count (solely quantitative data)
- It's easy to obtain (payroll records, business licenses, local/state business records)
- It's easy to publicize (newpaper headlines and tv stories saying "25 New Jobs Added")
- It's easy to compare (we added four new companies last year and you only added two!)
- Economic growth is easy if you can do it!



#### **Economic Development**

- While economic growth is a part of economic development, <u>it is not</u> economic development
- Economic growth is the purview of economic developers; economic development is the charge of area leadership providing direction to economic developers
- Not all jobs or companies are created equal!



### **Economic Development Metrics**

- #1 Better quality of life/higher standard of living
- Better educated population
- · Increased real per capita income
- Enhanced leisure opportunities
- Increased civic engagement
- Increased education levels




#### **Economic Development Strategies**

- Recruited companies must raise average wage
- Workforce prep programs (work ethic, soft skills, reading, basic math) starting in elementary school
- Pay attention to aesthetics don't be an ugly community with nothing to do
- Housing improvement programs
